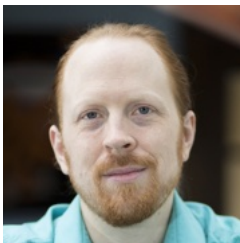
Liang Ding (ding@macalester.edu)

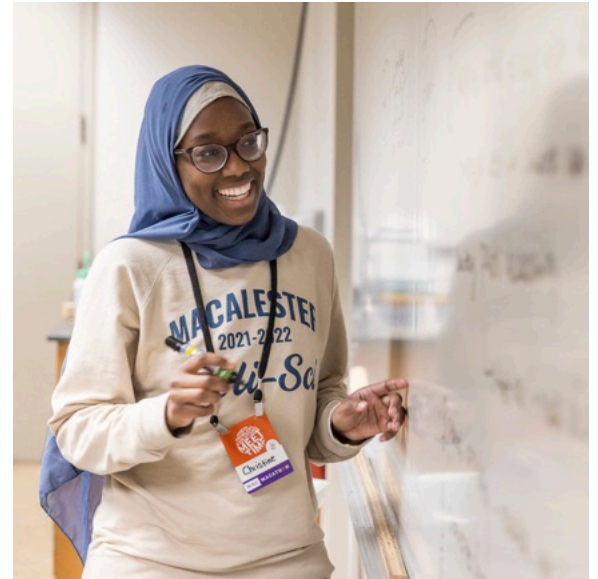
