## Thinking of Teaching?

A question you will run up against sooner or later, and probably already have, "What will you do with your –insert major here– degree?" Of course you should not worry overmuch, your Classics degree provides you the foundation to go in many directions. However, after preparation one must take action. If teaching is calling your name, a Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) is possibly your next step. According to The American Classical League (ACL) there is a Latin teacher shortage in the US.

Mount Holyoke College: offers a Master of Arts in Teaching program that allows aspiring middle and secondary school teachers to earn a master's degree and initial licensure in Latin in eleven months. ## Is Translation in your Future?

Translators interpret written text and should be able to write well in the target language. Both interpreting and translation require a deep knowledge of more than one tongue. Translating differs from interpreting in that translators deal with written text while interpreters translate orally. A graduate program in Arabic (or other language) translation may be a path to consider.
