VISION & VALUE

We foster a learning environment that challenges our students and supports them as they develop their own opinions. This means encouraging them to remain curious, listen deeply, practice discernment, and maintain a learning stance as they encounter ideas that are unfamiliar or even in conflict with their worldviews. We invite students to engage courageously with the most vexing controversies of the day. Sometimes it gets messy and that's okay.

APPROACH

We believe more speech-not less—is vital to learning. We treat differences of opinion as opportunities to learn and grow. For this reason, we encourage academic departments at Macalester to invite speakers to campus from across the political spectrum who are passionate about their areas of expertise. We train students to communicate persuasively in classes, using evidence to support their arguments. And, through cocurricular programming, we provide opportunities to apply these skills in dialogue with others.

A Presidential Initiative <----

Dialogue Across Differences is an initiative launched by Dr. Rivera as a centerpiece of her presidency. In Fall 2024, she assembled an advisory group composed of faculty and staff to coordinate the various programs and seek student input. In the 2025–26 academic year, student members will be added to the advisory group.

LESSONS LEARNED

The most impactful work results from a combination of visionary leadership and broad buy-in from the grassroots.

Online learning might not be a good fit for Macalester. We can develop our own in-person dialogue curriculum, possibly delivered in small cohorts who can then teach and work with their peers.

Dialogue work should infuse everything we do and become a lens through which we do community building and educational work. Pathways to Peace, for example, can benefit from dialogue processes.
