Harp-Pollack NYC Public Interest Fellowship - Grete Eherenman

I spent the summer working with The Child Mind Institute, a non-profit organization based in New York City that offers a range of therapeutic options and programs to children of all ages who are dealing with mental health issues. I worked 40 hours a week, one-on-one with children encouraging prosocial behaviors and interaction with their peers. Over the four-week program, we celebrated a lot of success with kiddos starting conversations, speaking in front of the group, and staying calm when frustrated which were three common goals for most of them. The internship was unpaid, so the Harp-Pollack grant allowed me to rent an apartment in Manhattan, as well as pay for necessities and travel. I can confidently say living in New York for the summer was a life-changing experience that I could not have had without the assistance of the grant. I not only gained valuable work experience in the field of clinical psychology, but made numerous professional and personal connections with people who will become my colleagues. I am extremely grateful to the sponsors of the Harp-Pollack grant, as well as Joan Ostrove for the opportunity and Jaine Strauss for her support.
