Hi, I'm Nate Powell, I use he/his/him pronouns and I'm excited to be teaching at Macalester in Module 4! I got my PhD in Neuroscience at the University of Minnesota in 2015, and after a few years in the Pacific Northwest at the University of British Columbia, I'm back in the Twin Cities doing research at UMN and teaching at Macalester. My research career has involved designing RF excitation pulses for MR imaging, computational modeling of human behavior, behavioral and electrophysiological recordings in rats, and viral based optical imaging in Ferrets. My research is focused on trying to understand the brain as a computational unit. In my module 4 Theoretical Neuroscience class we will be exploring the theoretical underpinnings of modern

neuroscience research from the individual circuit level to the level of explaining human behavior. Whenever I'm not working I enjoy building, riding, and talking about bicycles. Opportunities

We have an opening at the Minneapolis VA Health Care System for a part-time research assistant intern (Without Compensation) working as part of a team investigating PTSD treatment adherence for Veterans and family involvement in psychotherapy for PTSD. The intern will work primarily on two studies designed to improve trauma-focused psychotherapy for PTSD through family involvement. One study is a 3-site randomized controlled trial comparing standard Prolonged Exposure to Prolonged Exposure with family involvement. The second is a pilot study that combines Prolonged Exposure therapy with Integrative Behavioral Couples Therapy. Both studies are funded by the VA's Office of Research and Development and led by Principal Investigator Laura Meis, PhD. The studies are conducted out of the Center for Care Delivery and Outcomes Research, a VA Health Services Research Center of Innovation. REQUIRED QUALIFICATIONS:

- College junior or senior OR bachelor's degree OR master's degree.
- Equivalent of at least one year of research experience (can be as part of academic requirements).
- Experience in coordinating multiple tasks and project elements with differing time lines and completion deadlines.
- Strong organizational and interpersonal skills.

- Major in psychology, health services research, public health or related field.

DUTIES/RESPONSIBILITIES

- Review and extract data from medical records to determine participant eligibility.
- Assist in preparing recruitment letter mailings.
- Organize follow-up survey mailings and attempt to contact non-responders via telephone.
- Log, scan, and verify returned survey data into study database. Assist in data cleaning.
- Recruit subjects via telephone and conduct phone screenings to determine subject eligibility.
- Schedule informed consent meetings and clinical assessment interviews with participants using - - Microsoft Outlook.
- Assist with qualitative data summaries
- Transcribe therapy session recordings and other sensitive audio.
- Maintain orderly files and follow VA policies to maintain data security.
- Participate in staff meetings with senior staff.

Work Days: M-F; minimum 12 hours per week; work can be completed between the hours of 8am-7pm depending on the intern's schedule and study needs. We ask for a one-year (can be one school year) commitment.

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Michigan Summer Program in Cognition & Early Development (MSPICED) Department of Psychology, University of Michigan, Ann Arbor

The Michigan Summer Program in Cognition & Early Development (MSPICED) is jointly hosted by four developmental psychology laboratories led by Drs. [Susan Gelman](#), [Ioulia Kovelman](#), [Felix Warneken](#), and [Henry Wellman](#).

We are seeking motivated students to participate firsthand in developmental psychology research. Our research investigates the cognitive and social foundations of young children's behavior. In particular, we study how children cooperate with each other, think about the minds of others, and acquire language, as well as how language shapes children's thinking. We invite students from both the University of Michigan and other universities to apply!

Our 10-week program will run from June 1st to August 6th, 2021. The program will be fully remote this year, with opportunities for online testing. Interns do not need to be in Ann Arbor to participate in the program.

Each summer intern will be paired with a graduate student or postdoctoral fellow mentor (see [Researchers](#)) to work on a research project. Interns will gain experience in a variety of research activities, including conducting online experimental studies with children, processing and analyzing data using state-of-the-art statistical software, recruiting and scheduling families, and helping with study design. Interns will also be introduced to developmental neuroscience research methods, including functional near-infrared spectroscopy (fNIRS).

In addition to working on specific research projects, interns will attend weekly lab meetings, reading groups, statistical analysis workshops, and professional development seminars on various topics (e.g., applying to graduate school and writing research statements), which will all be hosted online. At the end of the program, interns will present their projects to members of the Psychology Department at an online poster fair.

Successful candidates should demonstrate enthusiasm in developmental psychology and in working with children and families. Previous research experience is desirable, although not required. We offer both full-time (40 hr/week) and part-time (20 hr/week) positions.

University of Michigan students can find intramural funding through the [LSA Opportunity Hub](#). Work study positions and additional funding may be available on a case-by-case basis for eligible students.

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As you may know, I have conducted the Children's Summer Treatment Program (STP) for children with ADHD and related impairments for 40 years, most recently through the Center for Children and Families at Florida International University. The STP has been named a Model Program in Child and Family Mental Health by the American Psychological Association, and has been named a program of the year by CHADD, the national parent advocacy group for children with ADHD. I am writing to ask your help in making outstanding students aware of the numerous positions we have available. Positions are available for students who are interested in working with children in Pre-Kindergarten, Kindergarten, and Elementary age groups. Below is a brief description of the available positions in our STP. I hope that you will encourage interested students to apply. Applications for all positions are competitive, so students should apply as soon as possible. Students who have participated in the program have uniformly viewed the experience as an extremely demanding one, but one that makes a great contribution to their professional development. With very few exceptions, they highly recommend working in the program. For example, on feedback forms administered at the end of recent programs, approximately ninety percent of undergraduates felt that the experience contributed very much to their career goals, and that they would recommend the program to other undergraduates. The experience and recommendations gained in our program have helped many of our undergraduates continue in graduate careers in the helping professions. The experience is also quite useful for undergraduate students interested in clinical research in child psychopathology, pharmacology, and psychotherapy.
