Grad School Panel on Academic Careers in Psychology

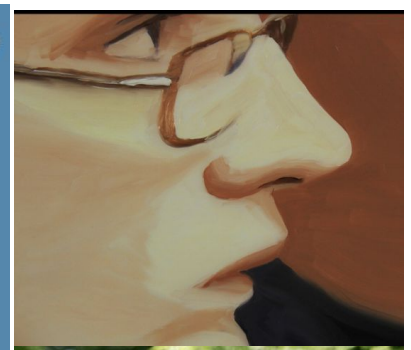

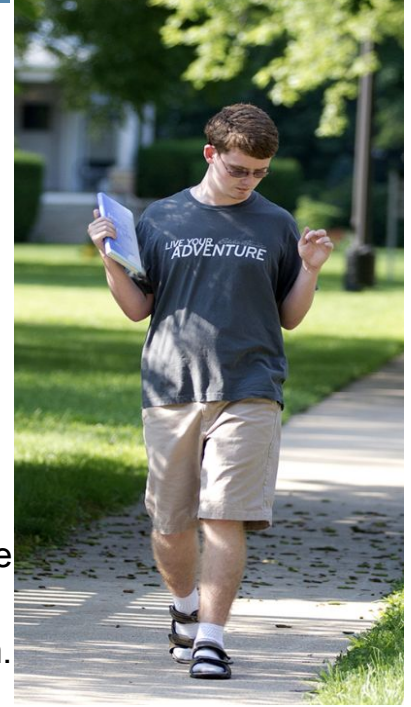
DEEJ

DJ makes his way through high school and the transition into college, as he confronts the terrors of his past, obstacles to inclusion, and the sometimes paralyzing beauty of his own senses. Postcards from Study Away - Stephanie Konadu-Acheampong

Hello! My name is Stephanie and I'm a junior Psych and Linguistics double major. I'm studying abroad in Copenhagen with DIS.

I'm taking four courses: my core course Children in a Multi Cultural context, and electives Positive Organizational Psych, Neuroscience of Religion and Atheism, and Beginning Danish. My core course is definitely my favorite class this semester. I specifically chose to come to Scandinavia so I could explore their unique approach to education and why it garners more successful results than the US system. This class also provides a unique lens that I can view the system through by providing a framework that allows me to also challenge it and how Denmark is attempting to include and support children of "non Western" backgrounds. I love the class because discussions, readings, and field studies are always really engaging and also because every week I get to go to my assigned practicum site! My practicum is Danish elementary school an hour outside Copenhagen. 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Mental Health First Aid course. [Registration is now live for the next course in November!](#)

Instructors from the [National Alliance for Mental Illness MN \(NAMI MN\)](#) are coming to Macalester on **Sunday, November 17**, from **8AM – 5PM** in the **Weyerhaeuser Boardroom** to certify 30 people as Mental Health First Aid providers.

This course is free for all Mac students/employees/community members. A \$40 deposit is required upon registration to ensure attendance. If you attend the course, this deposit will be refunded entirely. If you do not attend the class (without canceling 48 hours in advance), you will lose your deposit. If this deposit poses a barrier for you, email mfa@macalester.edu and we can work something out. Our priority is keeping Mental Health First Aid accessible.

You will receive a course manual, and **a certification upon completion of the course.** You will learn about common mental illnesses and co-occurring disorders. Understanding and recognizing the signs that someone needs help is the first step in getting that person appropriate care and treatment. This course counts for 9 continuing education hours for EMTs.



GAP YEAR OPPORTUNITY FOR GRADUATING SENIORS

HANDS OF HOPE

What is this? This program typically lasts for one year and gives young adults the opportunity to care for children under the age of six years old at the time of placement who are currently in residential care with our agency.

What will I be doing? Everything necessary to properly and safely care for, advocate for and meet the daily needs of four to five children placed in your home.

Will I be doing this alone? The community is made up of ten homes in a gated neighborhood that have approximately four Hands of Hope House Parents in each home.

How will this help my future? This gives you the opportunity to earn hands on experience learning how abuse, neglect, and the effects of HIV play a role in some of society's most vulnerable children. You will be working directly with therapists, specialists, and social workers to meet the specific needs for each individual child.
